

## Program Overview

Awarded annually and administered by the Department of Housing and Community Development (DHCD), the program works to strengthen Vermont communities. Since 1998, the Municipal Planning Grant Program has provided over \$12 million to 234 cities and towns across Vermont to help breathe new life into communities, plan for future growth and investment, and improve the quality of life.

This year's Municipal Planning Grants, range from \$3,000 to \$35,000 with total requests exceeding \$950,000. Competitively awarded, 67 total applications were reviewed with 29 recipients selected. Funded projects range from a multi-town initiative in Addison County, linking four communities through a cycling route, identifying options for repurposing the town school buildings in Holland, and envisioning a safer, more connected and flood resilient downtown in Brattleboro. Grants will help other towns adopt useful and relevant municipal plans, update their regulations, and revitalize communities.
